Remembering Hilary Blackler - We are saddened to announce the passing of long-time Streetscape member, Hilary Blackler. Hilary was one of the original members of PIRO (People Interested in Revitalizing Oroville). PIRO was responsible for planting the first trees in downtown Oroville. In 1995, Hilary joined a new committee called "The Oroville Streetscape Committee", which would maintain the downtown trees and beautify downtown Oroville. Hilary and Joan Cool co-chaired one of Streetscape's first energetic projects; building Centennial Park, which was completed in 2008. Hilary was Lynn Chapman's right-hand woman when she took over as chairman of Oroville Streetscape in 2010. She was actively involved in every project: choosing sidewalk benches for downtown streets, developing Welcome Gate Park, landscaping the new Oroville Police Station, contacting citizens for donations for flowers and projects every year, raising money for the town clock, planting flowers downtown in the spring, watering flower pots and maintaining flower beds throughout the summers, and cleaning out hanging flower baskets in the fall. She even cleaned the sidewalks after Lynn's tree pruning in the spring for many years. She was a tireless worker!!!! Hilary maintained an active role as an Oroville Tree Board Member until the end of her

life, helping to recommend to the City of Oroville which trees needed to be replaced (she never wanted to see a tree removed!). Hilary loved trees, flowers, and Oroville. Hilary's wish was for The Oroville Streetscape Committee to continue its mission of beautifying downtown Oroville. We hope new volunteers will join us in fulfilling Hilary's wish. Her memorial service will be at The Oroville Episcopal Church on Tuesday, January 9th at 1:00 PM.
