What's Happening in Oroville in November?

Taking on the Texaco Station - We were thrilled to see the City of Oroville and Building Official Bryan Forbus step in last month and "take on" the Texaco Station on Main street. The broken windows and general state of disrepair at the empty gas station has been a topic of discussion in the community for some time. Last month, with the support of City Council, officials were able to step in and enforce the building codes that were being violated. The property has since been repaired and cleaned up. Great job to all involved!

Abandoned Building & Vacant Lots Strategies - With the City of Oroville taking a proactive step in ensuring the cleanup of the vacant Texaco station, it reminds us that there is still more to do to restore Oroville's downtown. To restore our downtown core to its former glory, we must work collectively as a community.
